PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It is hard to believe that we are down to only about three months of school until the end of the year! March is another exciting and busy month at Didion. We packed a lot into the short month of February. We had a visit from the Lawrence Hall of Science, who provided a fun, hands-on assembly for our students. Our 4th-6th grade basketball team formed and has already played two games, bringing home two big victories with hopefully many more to come. Qualifying Exam March 11th at 8:15 am in the Library

Are you interested in getting a taste of the college experience? Academic Talent Search (ATS) offers 4th-9th graders (grade level as of 1/1/19) exciting summer courses at Sacramento State that you pick for yourself! Choose from classes like All the World's a Stage, Algebra 1, Escape Room Math, Messy Science, Photoshop, Robotics, Neuropsychology, Video Game Development and many others. At ATS, you can spend your summer doing what you love, take classes on a university campus, and make new friends who share your interests and passion for learning!

To join these interactive and hands-on classes, you need to take the ATS Qualifying Exam. The test takes about an hour and there is no pass or fail, so there's no need to stress. You **MUST** take the test to apply for classes, but you don't have to apply if you change your mind. The Qualifying Exam requires a \$20 processing fee and will be offered at Didion on Monday, March 11, 2019 at 8:15am in the Library.

Look for the ATS information sheet and test sign-up form attached to the end of this newsletter for class information and costs. A hard copy will also be coming home soon.

What is Academic Talent Search (ATS)?

- A unique summer program that allows students to explore in-depth the subjects they love.
- An opportunity to explore potential college majors and career pathways.
- A chance to preview the "college" experience in a fast-paced, supportive environment.

Why should I participate?

- Explore interesting topics with interactive hands-on classes designed to encourage critical thinking, problem solving, and analytical skills.
- Enhance your independence while being treated like "college students" on the Sacramento State campus.
- Gain self-confidence and try out potential career paths while learning in University classrooms and labs.
- Learn from university professors, public and private school teachers, and leading business professionals.
- Discover new academic and creative challenges in topics not always available in regular school.
- Accelerate your learning in traditional subjects. ATS classes feature above-grade-level curriculum. So a class in the 4-5 Program may be covering 8th grade content standards while a class in the 6-9 Program might be completing a year's worth of high school material in 5 weeks.

How do I get involved?

- Be in 4th - 9th grade as of January 1, 2019.
- Take the ATS Qualifying Exam (*College Ability Test*), which assesses your reasoning abilities.

 - Current 6th - 9th graders take the "advanced" level exam.
- Taking the test automatically qualifies you for the program. There is no pass or fail.
- Use your test scores to help determine which ATS classes best match your skills and interests.
 - There are classes available for ALL score levels.

Where can I take the test?

AT SACRAMENTO STATE

Cost Overview

Because ATS receives no government funding or tax monies, course fees support the cost of offering the classes. Class fees for Summer 2018 ranged from \$150 to \$450 depending on the length of the course.



4-5 Program 1-week course: \$355*

6-9 Program 1-week short course: \$150*
1- and 3-week regular classes: \$360*
5-week accelerated courses: \$450*

* Fees listed are from Summer 2018. 2019 fee information will be included in the ATS Summer Catalog available in late March.

Financial Aid and Scholarships

ATS recognizes that some families' financial circumstances make it difficult to participate in classes. To provide equal educational opportunities for all qualified students regardless of the financial resources of the family, ATS offers testing fee waivers and financial aid for summer classes.

Each year, ATS provides fee reduction scholarships to students from economically disadvantaged families who otherwise might not be able to attend due to costs. Applicants whose family income levels are lowest are awarded larger scholarships than those reporting higher incomes.

Test Sign-Up Form & ATS Information

❖ Congratulations! ❖

Your school is offering you the opportunity to participate in Academic Talent Search (ATS) at Sacramento State. As mentioned on the **Information for Students and Parents** sheet (provided by your school), ATS offers fun, interactive, fast-paced summer classes to 4th through 9th grade students. Our program gives students the opportunity to study in fields like art, business, computer science, engineering, law, and science (as well as other subjects not readily available to students in this age group). Last year, some of our most popular classes included Algebra 1, Introduction to Japanese, LEGO Robotics, Mock Trial, and Neuropsychology. Since 1982, more than 46,500 students have taken advantage of the educational opportunities provided by ATS on the Sac State campus. In 2018, ATS awarded over \$22,000 in financial aid and fee waivers to students.

To be eligible for ATS, all you need to do is be a current 4th through 9th grade student (grade level as of January 1, 2019) and take the ATS Qualifying Exam. Taking the test automatically qualifies you for ATS. The test takes a little over an hour and assesses your academic abilities. Students in 4th and 5th grades take the “intermediate” level exam, while 6th through 9th graders take the “advanced” level test. Good news! Scores do NOT affect your school grades, and there is no “failing” the ATS test- it gives you a measurement of your academic abilities and strengths. Taking the test does not mean you have to attend ATS, but it gives you the **option** to attend these fun and unique classes at Sac State this summer.

Your ATS School Representative (usually the person who gave you this form) can tell you when the test will be offered at your school. To sign up, complete the back of this sheet and return it to your School Representative at least one week prior to the testing date. **On the day of the test, bring the \$20 processing fee with you (fees should not be submitted before the exam).** This fee covers the scoring of your exam and the mailing of your test results directly to your home. If you cannot afford the test processing fee, ask your School Representative about a *Testing Fee Waiver*.

Why should I take this test?

The *College Ability Test* can offer valuable experience in taking a college admission-type exam. Test results also help identify special aptitudes to be further developed. There is no risk in testing, as test scores do not affect your regular school grades. The test is designed for older students, so you are not expected to know all of the answers or prepare for the test in any way.

If I have taken the test before, do I have to take it again?

If you are currently in grade 6 or above and last tested as a 4th or 5th grader, you will need to test again to take the “advanced” level exam this year. Because classes are filled top-score down, **ATS strongly encourages all students to take the test every year**. ATS will accept your highest scores from the appropriate level of the exam, so there is no risk in retesting!

How much does the test cost?

There is a \$20 processing fee (payable to ATS on the day of the test), which covers the scoring of your exam and the mailing of your test results directly to your home. If you cannot afford the processing fee, ask your School Representative about a *Testing Fee Waiver*.

❖About the ATS Qualifying Exam❖

The *College Ability Test* takes no more than 1 hour and 15 minutes – this includes instructions and two 20-minute sections (verbal and quantitative). Students take the multiple choice test appropriate for their grade: current 4th and 5th graders take the “intermediate” level, and current 6th–9th graders take the “advanced” level. Taking the test automatically qualifies you for ATS. The test is not “pass” or “fail,” as it does not measure specific knowledge; rather, it measures your academic abilities.

• Verbal Section

The verbal section tests your knowledge of the meaning of words and your ability to identify relationships between pairs of words. You will be asked to find the pair of words that go together in the same way as the first two words.

Example

gym : exercise ::

- a) cafeteria : eat c) car : sit
b) mall : sell d) auditorium : clap

Solution

To solve analogy questions, put the primary pair of words into a sentence which explains their relationship (“You go to a gym to exercise.”). Next, substitute the answer choices into your sentence until you create a sentence that makes sense. The correct answer is A: “Gym” is related to “exercise” as “cafeteria” is related to “eat”.

• Quantitative Section

The quantitative section tests how well you work with numbers. Each question has two parts (Column A and Column B). You must determine if the value presented in Column A is greater than the value presented in Column B, if the parts are equal, or if there is not enough information to decide.

Example

Column A

Value of 3 nickels
and 1 dime

Column B

Value of 2 dimes
and 1 nickel

- A if the part in Column A is greater
B if the part in Column B is greater
C if the two parts are equal
D if not enough information is given for you to decide

Solution

The example is asking you to add. Since a nickel is 5 cents and a dime is 10 cents, in Column A, $5+5+5+10$ is equal to 25. This is the same answer as $10+10+5$ in Column B. Therefore, the answer to the question is C.
