

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Welcome back, Didion family! I hope everyone had a restful and rejuvenating summer. We have had a great start to the school year, and I could not be more excited for what is in store for 2019-2020. With the new year, we do have a number of “good byes” and “welcomes” to make that developed over the summer or just at the start of this year. By now, most of you have heard that our beloved music teacher, Mrs. Elett Ricks-Chambers, has officially retired. Mrs. Chambers’ impact on students and on our community over the years cannot be sufficiently discussed and done justice in this small article. Mrs. Chambers has been a fixture at Didion for years, and has contributed immensely to what makes this school and this community amazing. Much more on and from Mrs. Chambers later in this newsletter! While we are sad to see Mrs. Chambers go from our daily program, we are thrilled that she will continue to lead and direct our Thanksgiving and Winter programs this year. We are beyond grateful that Mrs. Chambers will continue this celebration of our students’ talents under her guidance. The shows must go on!

There are also lots of changes going on in the Didion library this year! With Mrs. Chambers’ retirement, Mrs. Rechs will now be on campus full-time as our elementary prep teacher, allowing us to provide our students with more robust library services.

Classes in grades 1-6 will continue to visit the library each week but that visit will increase from 30 minutes to 45. The extra time will allow students more freedom to explore great books, talk about what they are reading and work on important information literacy skills. Students in grades 1-6 will also participate in an additional 45 minute information technology class with Mrs. Rechs that will address several areas of digital literacy.

Depending on the grade level, topics will include digital citizenship and cyber safety, source evaluation, website design, basic coding skills and the creation of digital presentations. We are building this exciting new part of the library program from the ground up, so stay tuned for more information as it grows and evolves. Finally, the icing on the cake is that the library will now be open to students and families every day before and after school so please stop in, say hi and maybe check-out a book. Mrs. Rechs would love to see you!

The end of last year also brought the retirements of our former office manager, Kim Tsumura, as well as our middle school science teacher, Dana Flaten. Gail Hori, our longtime clerk, has since assumed the role of office manager and I couldn't be more thrilled! She has been doing an awesome job in her transition, despite the multitude of challenges that the beginning of the year brings. Our new middle school science teacher is Rocio Almanza. She brings great experience, enthusiasm, and warmth to our team and to our middle schoolers. We are lucky to have her! Alice Wong has also re-joined our staff (she worked here several years ago) as our new speech therapist. Welcome back, Ms. Wong! We are also very fortunate to have Debra Aban with us. Mrs. Aban has been doing a fantastic job teaching 3rd grade for us in room 8 in the position once held by Jeremy MacDonald, who has retired and will be sorely missed.

Lastly, we have said good bye and best of luck to Wendell Birt, our school plant manager, who left last week to take over operations at another larger school in the district after several years at Didion. We hope to be interviewing and hiring soon for his replacement, and in the meantime Ms. Indigeo Hall will be filling in. Thank you, Ms. Hall!

At the beginning of the year I always like to give parents some important safety reminders. First, we all know that traffic around drop-off and pick-up time is a challenge. I want us to always be mindful of traffic and pedestrian safety during these times, and to exercise caution and patience. Please refrain from making u-turns in front of the school and also from parking in loading zones (i.e. on Harmon Dr. along the school side of the street), or dropping off/picking up students in the staff parking lots.

Additionally, adults and students alike should use the crosswalks when crossing the streets. Also, when you do have to park, be careful to not block the driveways of any of our neighbors. When picking up your child on campus, we also ask that you please wait outside of the breezeway/hallways so that the halls do not become overcrowded and so that teachers may teach to the bell. Lastly, I want to remind everyone that anyone who is on campus after 8:15 needs to check in with the main office and get a visitor badge. Safety is our number one priority and collectively we must commit to procedures that help us keep the campus safe.

This is going to be an AMAZING year. The staff and I are excited and committed to making this year even better than the last. Mrs. Cathy Rechs Librarian



Mrs. Rechs is Didion's Librarian, and beginning this year will be teaching full-time. In addition to the library, she will be teaching digital literacy during information technology class.



How did you end up at Didion?

I came to Didion as a parent 10 years ago. I had been a classroom teacher but paused my career to stay home with my kids. When my son was 3 I toured a bunch of schools in the area. After seeing Mrs. Martinez teach kindergarten, I decided that Didion was where we needed to be. Years later, the librarian position opened up just when I was ready to get back into education. I loved the job so much that I went back to school to get my librarian credential and masters degree. It's been a lot of fun (and a lot more hard work). I'll be so happy to graduate in May!

What's your role at Didion? What are some goals you might have for our kids?

My role changed this year and I couldn't be more excited. I'm now full-time which gives me so much more space to build a robust library program for the kids. This year they will get a longer weekly library visit which will give us more time to read and talk about books and to learn how to find the right book at the right time. THEN I get to see them a second time each week for an information technology class. We'll work on digital citizenship, coding, website design, digital presentation software and information literacy. There aren't that many opportunities to work full-time as a librarian in an elementary school, this job is literally a dream come true for me.



What are some fun facts about you?

Hmmm... fun facts? I paid for college by becoming a truck driver. I got my commercial license and hauled tomatoes 16 hours a day 7 days a week all summer for 3 years. It allowed me to pay for my entire education without any loans. I'm probably not the only truck driver turned librarian in the world, but there can't be too many of us!




LIBRARY CORNER



MEET THE AUTHOR


Lisa McMann

On September 27th, Ms. McMann will spend about 45 minutes with our students giving a presentation about the Unwanteds series, including writing tips and side stories about what it's like to be an author. She will discuss how she got the idea for the Unwanteds series (and how writers come up with ideas for stories), how her kids were involved in this series from the time they were 12 and 9, and talk about art, as well as the creativity theme in the books. 





She grew up in New York, where a flourishing music curriculum instilled in her an appreciation for arts and education. Mrs. Chambers is an invaluable part of Didion and much revered among students, families and alumni.



What is your earliest musical memory?

Please allow me to share more than one...

My mom playing the piano and singing songs to me. Music is in my DNA, I am sure I responded to my mother's music before I was even born.

I vividly remember performing in my first piano recital, I think I was almost 4.

There were hundreds of people in the audience. I can still see the beautiful dress I wore with lace socks and patent leather shoes. My legs dangled from the piano bench because I was so small.

My piano teacher was Mrs. Elett Dixon. She was my mom's teacher and my mom named me after her.

I can name the location because there were many more recitals that followed, it was Kleinhans Music Hall in Buffalo, New York.

My first piece was my teacher's arrangement of the story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears. My teacher and I told the story and I played a theme on the piano for each of the characters and the action in the story.
